

Simple and compound sentence answer sheet

Exercise 1

1. Stephen must study. **simple**
2. Stephen is going to take a test. **simple**
3. The test is on Friday. **simple**
4. Stephen will probably do well on the test, **but** he needs to study hard. **compound**
5. The test will be very difficult, **so** his dad has promised to buy him an ice cream afterwards. **compound**

Exercise 2

1. Jill is going to Spain and Portugal for her holidays. **simple ('and' is not being used here to connect two main clauses and neither is 'for')**
2. Jill's grandma lives in Spain. **simple**
3. Jill loves going to Spain and Portugal every summer for two weeks. **simple (again, 'for' is not being used to connect two main clauses here, so the sentence is not a compound sentence)**
4. Jill will take a plane to get there **or** her friend may decide to drive her there. **compound**
5. Jill likes traveling **so** she can watch movies on her tablet. **compound**

Exercise 3

1. Grandma Judy loves Minecraft. **simple**
2. Grandma Judy doesn't visit any of her grandchildren anymore, **nor** does she see any of her friends. **compound**
3. Grandma Judy played Minecraft yesterday **and** she forgot to make breakfast. **compound**
4. Grandma Judy's eyes are tired from playing Minecraft. **simple**
5. I told Grandma Judy that she must stop playing Minecraft **or** she will have an accident. **compound**
