



Now you need to think about how large an area you are going to draw – this depends on where you live; you could draw just your street or your whole village if you live in one, for example.

Once you have decided on the area, list all of the features that you need to show. This might include the following, as well as your own ideas:

- your house
- street names
- shops
- churches, schools, parks etc.
- rivers and hills
- post boxes, signposts, other local features.

Once you have made a list, you will need to decide upon a symbol for each feature (think back to Lesson Three for what makes a good symbol).

Task 2:

You will need to make two versions of your map: a rough one first and then a neat one. This is because you will often find you have not left enough room for some of your features! Sketch out a rough version of your map, starting with the roads and pathways, then adding the location of different features. Think about what could be improved upon in the neat version.

Task 3:

Draw your final version of your map. It is very important that you include a title and a key. Think about colour, shading and symbols. You could also add a compass – if you don't know where North is relative to your map, you can look it up on Google Maps.

Task 4:

Can you write an evaluation of your map? Try to write three positive things about it and three things that you feel could be improved.
